What is conflict?

Conflict is defined as a <u>struggle</u> or <u>problem</u> between <u>forces</u>.



Conflict is important because it is the challenge or struggle the <u>protagonist</u> must face in a story. Without it, we would have no <u>plot</u>.

Don't forget that there can be more than <u>one</u> conflict in the plot of a story.

Conflict can fit into two main categories: internal or external.





Internal conflict is a mental or emotional struggle that occurs within ones self.

External conflict is a problem that happens between two characters or another outside force.

There are four main types of conflict.


1. Person vs. Person

A person struggles against another person.

This struggle can be physical, but can also be a struggle of ideas or emotions.

Example:

A child gets teased by a bully on the school yard.



Examples of Person vs. Person

- Luke Skywalker and Darth Vader
- Dorothy and the Wicked Witch of the West
- Sherlock Holmes and Professor Moriarty
- Katniss Everdeen and President Snow


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2. Person vs. Nature

A person struggles against forces of nature. This can include forces like storms, struggles against animals, and struggles against physical ailments, like disease.

Example:

A child in a wheelchair struggles with the inability to walk after an accident.



Examples of Person vs. Nature

- In Hatchet, Brian struggles to survive in the Canadian wilderness
- In Titanic, the characters struggle against the Atlantic ocean
- In The Wizard of Oz, Dorothy has conflict with the tornado, the apple trees, and the poppies.
- In The Life of Pi, Pi must survive on a boat adrift on the ocean with a tiger on board!

3. Person vs. Society

A person struggles against the society in which he or she lives. It is usually a fight against social traditions, rules, or laws.

Example: Simon is not served ice cream in his town because they don't provide services for "little people"



Examples of Person vs. Society

- In The Incredibles, super heroes are not allowed to be super because society fears their power.
- In The Hunger Games, Katniss fights against her oppressive society for freedom.
- In Charlotte's Web, Wilbur must struggle to stay alive in a society that eats pigs.
- In Star Wars, Luke and the other rebels fight against The Empire.

4. Person vs. Self

A person struggles with something within his or her own mind, usually having to do with a choice between right and wrong, or overcoming mixed emotions or feelings.

Example:

A student must decide whether or not to cheat on a test.
