---

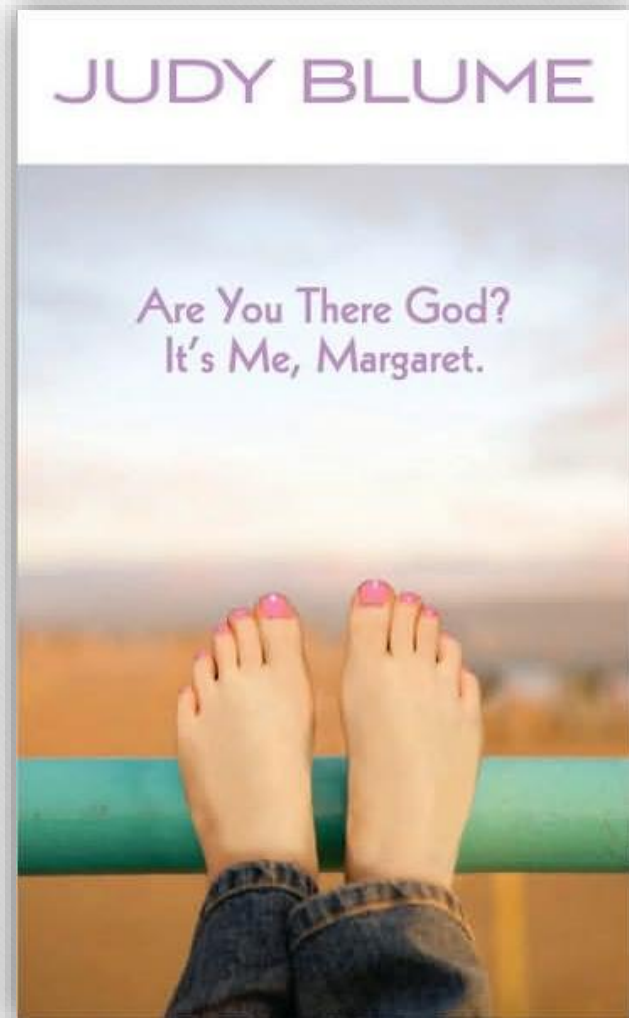

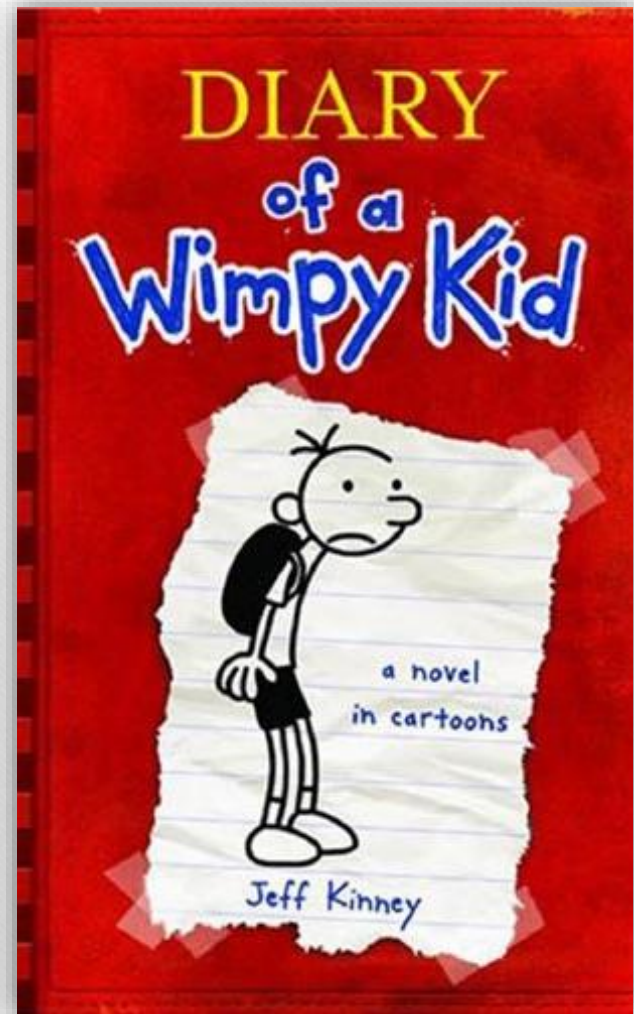


“SEPTEMBER
